

Illinois law requires Teacher Aides/Paraprofessionals to be licensed through the Illinois State Board of Education (ISBE). To qualify for a license you must be at least 19 years of age and have proof of one of the following:

- an Associate's Degree or higher
- a minimum of 60 approved college hours (which shall not include any remedial or developmental coursework)
- a High School Diploma or GED and a score of 460 or higher on the ETS Parapro test
- a High School Diploma or GED and the following scores on the ACT Workkeys: Applied Mathematics/Applied Math (with a score of 4) and Reading for Information/Workplace Documents (with a score of 4)

Once you have the necessary hours, you must apply for and be granted a license by ISBE. The District does not approve college coursework or grant licenses. Additional details can be found [here](#).
